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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Hillcrest ES serves 488 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 23% Hispanic and 77% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 66% White, 17% Black, 0% Native, 6% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 11% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Stacey Tanenbaum and Assistant Principal Samantha Guise. Hillcrest ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include French and Spanish Language Academies, Sunshine State Readers Award, Book Club, Battle of the Books and News Crew.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Hillcrest ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2010 and the number of books per student is 20. The <u>American</u> <u>Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Hillcrest ES does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Students at our school are scoring above the county average.
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 ebooks, audiobooks and digital magazines.
- Our collection has an appropriate amount of books for the age range of our students.
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project expectations as well as aged titles in fiction and nonfiction.



Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.



Collection Analysis by Category

The information collected in this section provides a detailed look at the current library collection by classification and genre. The information was gathered from Follett Destiny, the library management system, and Titlewave, the vendor's ordering and analysis tool.

- Collection is in need of updated language books.

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Based on the available school data of Hillcrest ES in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:
